- Develop toolkits and educational resources for communities to use to fight environmental injustice.













Hellbent Film Impact



Grant Township Support

The campaign developed postcards to be handed out at community events for people to write notes of support for Grant Township during their fight so they do not lose momentum and their fighting spirit. Over 100 letters were received by the community.

Swaying public opinion in favor of Grant Township

Over a decade ago, Grant Township received notice from Pennsylvania Gas and Electric about the installation of an injection well in their community. Despite facing opposition from the community, the persistence of Pennsylvania Gas and Electric led to a prolonged legal battle, involving lawsuits from PGE and the Pennsylvania Department of Environmental Protection. The case traversed multiple courts, including the Pennsylvania Supreme Court to rule on the decision to allow Grant Townships Rights of Nature clause stand. Leading up to that court case in fall of 2023, the Hellbent team targeted communities living in the area to get as many eyes on the film as possible to help sway the court of public opinion.

An investigation revealed that the proposed injection well site had been mismanaged by PGE, and was in several environmental violations. The court determined the well could not go in, allowing Grant Township, and the hellbender to maintain access to clean water.

Hellbent's Continued Impact

The team is committed to sustaining the impact campaign by expanding film screenings, including participation in renowned platforms such as WildScreen, and engaging with additional Appalachia-based film festivals. This strategic approach aims to resonate with communities facing similar challenges to those portrayed in the film.

Furthermore, the campaign plans to deploy educational materials in classrooms across Appalachia, targeting schools in rural areas that overlap with hellbender and fracking zones. Building on the film's momentum, the team endeavors to organize local, in-person screenings throughout Appalachia, fostering connections with more community members. The extended impact campaign is slated to span 2024 and 2025, demonstrating a long-term dedication to effecting positive change.

Currently, Running Wild Media and Wild Lens are actively seeking film distribution and a strategic impact partner to amplify the campaign's reach and influence.
